

Author bio: Leonid Vasilyevich Solovyov was born in 1906 in Lebanon. He began his writing career as a newspaper reporter in Uzbekistan, where he also studied regional folklore. In the 1930s, he moved to Moscow and graduated from a literary and screenwriting program. *Disturber of the Peace* – part one of Solovyov's best known work, *The Tale of Hodja Nasreddin* – was published in 1939. During WWII, Solovyov served as a war correspondent.

In 1946, Solovyov was arrested by the Soviet secret police after making a comment about Stalin, and imprisoned until 1954. The second part of *The Tale of Hodja Nasreddin*, subtitled *The Enchanted Prince*, was written in the prison camps. After his release, Solovyov settled in Leningrad, where he remained until his death in 1962.
